The Superfund program (CERCLA) takes it beyond the grave. In California, the Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC) implements RCRA. You will learn about:

Proposition 65

Prop 65 imposes notification/warning requirements on facilities that have certain chemicals deemed by the State of California to be cancer causing or to have reproductive toxicity. The Act also allows for citizen enforcement. You will learn about:

- The key elements of Prop 65
- Requirements for warning notices
- No significant risk determinations
- Up-to-date list of Prop 65 chemicals
- Enforcement trends and strategy for averting private citizen actions

Inspections, Enforcement and Liability
